I. RATIONALE

The National Capital Region Planning Board was constituted in 1985 by an Act of Parliament with the following objectives:

- Preparation of a plan for the development of the National Capital Region;
- · Coordinating and monitoring the implementation of the said Plan; and
- Evolving harmonized policies for control of land uses and developing infrastructure in the Region so as to avoid any haphazard development of the Region.

II. CONSTITUTION AND MEMBERSHIP OF THE BOARD

The present constitution of the Board, as per the MoUD's Gazette Notification No. K-11019/3/2012-DDVI dated 14th February, 2014, is as under:

III. FUNCTIONS

The Functions of the NCR Planning Board as per Section 7 of the NCRPB Act, 1985 are:

- (a) to prepare the Regional Plan and the Functional Plans;
- (b) to arrange for the preparation of Sub-Regional Plans and Project Plans by each of the participating states and the Union territory:
- (c) to co-ordinate the enforcement and implementation of the Regional Plan, Functional Plans, Sub-Regional Plans and Project Plans through the participating States and the Union territory;
- (d) to ensure proper and systematic programming by the participating States and the Union territory in regard to project formulation, determination of priorities in the National Capital Region or sub-regions and phasing of development of the National Capital Region in accordance with stages indicated in the Regional Plan:
- (e) to arrange for, and oversee, the financing of selected development projects in the National Capital Region through Central and State plan funds and other sources of revenue.

IV. POWERS

The Powers of the NCR Planning Board as per Section 8 of the NCRPB Act, 1985 are:

- (a) call for reports and information from the participating States and the Union territory with regard to preparation, enforcement and implementation of Functional Plans and Sub-Regional Plans;
- (b) ensure that the preparation, enforcement and implementation of Functional Plan or Sub-Regional Plan, as the case may be, is in conformity with the Regional Plan:
- (c) indicate the stages for the implementation of the Regional Plan;
- (d) review the implementation of the Regional Plan, Functional Plan, Sub-Regional Plan and Project Plan;
- (e) select and approve comprehensive projects, call for priority development and provide such assistance for the implementation of those projects as the Board may deem fit;
- (f) select, in consultation with the State Government concerned, any urban area, outside the National Capital Region having regard to its location, population and potential for growth, which may be developed in order to achieve the objectives of the Regional Plan; and
- (g) entrust to the Committee such other functions as it may consider necessary to carry out the provisions of this Act.

V. AREA OF NCR

National Capital Region (NCR) is a unique example of interstate regional planning for development of a region with NCT-Delhi as its core. As per the Regional Plan-2021, the NCR covers an area of about 34,144 sq. kms. falling in the territorial jurisdiction of participating States of Haryana, Uttar Pradesh, Rajasthan and NCT-Delhi.

Ministry of Urban Development vide Gazette Notification dated 01.10.2013 and 24.11.2015, has added Bhiwani, Mahendragarh, Jind and Karnal districts of State of Haryana; Bharatpur district of State of Rajasthan and Muzaffarnagar district of State of Uttar Pradesh in NCR. Consequent of these Notifications, the area of NCR is about 53,817 sq.kms and population is 568.8 lakhs as per Census 2011.

NCR accounts for about 1.64% of the country's land area. It is characterized by the presence of ecologically sensitive areas (Aravallis, forests, wildlife and bird sanctuaries, rivers Ganga, Yamuna and Hindon etc.), fertile cultivated land, and is a dynamic rural-urban region.

VI. COUNTER MAGNET AREAS

The NCR Planning Board Act, 1985, under Section 8 (f), empowers the Board to select any area outside the NCR having regard to its location, population and potential for growth as a 'Counter Magnet Area' in consultation with the State Government concerned with a view to achieving the objectives of the Regional Plan.

Regional Plan -2001 identified the following five Counter Magnet Areas:

- i) Hisar in Haryana
- ii) Bareilly in Uttar Pradesh
- iii) Kota in Rajasthan
- iv) Patiala in Punjab
- v) Gwalior in Madhya Pradesh

The Counter-Magnets were envisaged to play two distinctive mutually complementary roles viz.

- "As interceptors of migratory flows into NCR, which may escalate, as the accelerated development of NCR would provide a pull to migrants from the less developed adjoining areas; and
- As Regional Growth Centres, which would be able to achieve a balanced pattern of urbanization in the Region of their own setting over a period of time."





The Regional Plan-2021 has continued the policy of development of Counter Magnet Areas.

Based on the recommendations of the Study on "Counter Magnet Areas to Delhi and NCR", NCR Planning Board in the 32nd Meeting held on 22.03.2012 approved the following cities/towns as Counter-Magnet Areas for NCR:

- i) Hisar in Haryana
- ii) Bareilly in Uttar Pradesh
- iii) Kota in Rajasthan
- iv) Patiala in Punjab
- v) Gwalior in Madhya Pradesh
- vi) Ambala in Harvana
- vii) Dehradun in Uttarakhand
- viii) Kanpur in Uttar Pradesh

Further, the NCR Planning Board in its 33rd meeting held on 01.07.2013, has also identified Jaipur as Counter Magnet Area to NCR. At present, nine Counter Magnet Areas have been identified as per Section 8 (f) of the NCRPB Act, 1985.

VII. THE PLANNING COMMITTEE

a) Constitution

Section 4(1) & (2) of the NCRPB Act mandates the constitution of a Planning Committee. The Member Secretary of the Board is the ex-officio Chairman of the Planning Committee. The constitution of the Planning Committee is as follows:-

c) Functions of the Planning Committee

As stipulated under Section 9 of the NCR Planning Board Act, 1985, the key functions of the Planning Committee are:


- 9. (1) The functions of the Committee shall be to assist the Board in-
 - (a) the preparation and co-ordinated implementation of the Regional Plan and the Functional Plans; and
 - (b) scrutinizing the Sub-Regional Plans and all Project Plans to ensure that the same are in conformity with the Regional Plan.
 - (2) The Committee may also make such recommendation to the Board as it may think necessary to amend or modify any Sub-Regional Plan or any Project Plan.
 - (3) The Committee shall perform such other functions as may be entrusted to it by the Board.

VIII. THE REGIONAL PLAN-2021 FOR NCR

NCR Planning Board has prepared a Regional Plan with the perspective year 2021 which was notified on 17.09.2005.

The Regional Plan-2021 for NCR provides a unique model for sustainable development of urban and rural settlements to improve the quality of life as well as ensuring a rational land use pattern to protect and preserve good agricultural land, preserve environmentally sensitive areas and laying down an inter-related policy framework relating to settlement systems, transportation, physical infrastructural facilities such as power and water, social infrastructure, disaster management, heritage and tourism.

The vision of the Plan is to develop the entire NCR as a region of global excellence. The Plan aims to promote economic growth and balanced development of the



Region and seeks to attain these through (a) providing suitable economic base for future growth by identification and development of regional settlements capable of absorbing the economic development impulse of Delhi; (b) providing efficient and economic rail and road based transportation networks (including mass transport systems) well integrated with the land use patterns to support balanced regional development in such identified settlements; (c) minimizing adverse environmental impact; (d) developing selected urban settlements with urban infrastructure facilities such as transport, power, communication, drinking water, sewerage and drainage comparable with Delhi; (e) providing a rational land use pattern; and (f) promoting sustainable development in the region for improving the quality of life.

The Regional Plan (RP) -2021 had made population projections for all sub-regions for 2021. However, as per census 2011, the NCR's population is 460.69 lakh in 2011 whereas the projected population in the RP-2021 was 486.19 lakh.

The thrust areas of the Regional Plan – 2021 for NCR are as follows:

- Laying down rational land uses at the Regional level in a harmonious pattern emerging from a careful examination (including use of Satellite Imagery from NRSC, Hyderabad) of natural features including susceptibility to natural disasters and socioeconomic activities
- Development of Metro and Regional Centres as powerful growth nodes to attract economic activities
- Provide regional transport linkages and Mass Commuter System
- Construction of peripheral expressways and orbital rail corridor around Delhi
- Development of core urban infrastructure (transport, power, water supply, sewerage, drainage) in NCR towns
- Development of the region's economy through Model Industrial Estates, Special Economic Zones, etc. outside NCT-Delhi

The Regional Plan-2021 for NCR has proposed a six tier Settlement System consisting of Metro Centres, Regional Centres, Sub-Regional Centres, Service Centres, Central Villages and Basic Villages. The Regional Plan-2021 has proposed 7 Metro Centres (city/complex with population of 10 lakh and above) and 11 Regional Centres (city/complex with population of 3 to 10 lakh) as follows:

In view of the rapid urbanization and growth in this area, the region is facing threat by way of haphazard unplanned development, unauthorized construction encroachments. In order to prevent haphazard development and to protect conversion of good agricultural land for non-agricultural uses, there is a dire need to prepare Master Plans of the NCR towns at different levels for urban settlements, following the policies laid down in the Regional Plan-2021 with a focus on the rural urban continuum. In development NCR. balanced of the addition. ensure proposals/strategies/projects are required for providing physical and social infrastructure like shelter, water, sewerage, sewage treatment, solid waste management, drainage. power, transport, etc. Projects also need to be implemented in a time bound manner by the NCR participating State Governments and their concerned Departments/Agencies.

Further, new and innovative approaches are required to be adopted by the concerned Agencies of the NCR participating States to improve & enhance the quality of physical infrastructure like power, water and sanitation. Ground water recharging and water harvesting are required to be integrated in the Building Bye Laws and amendments are also required to be carried out in various Town Planning/Urban Development/Urban Improvement Acts by the NCR participating State Governments for conserving water recharging areas. Regional Plan-2021 has highlighted concern for the depleting natural resources like water, forest and biodiversity especially as a consequence of the rapidly urbanizing NCR.

IX. THE YEAR IN RETROSPECT: 2015-16

The highlights of major activities undertaken and achievements made during 2015-16 are as follows:

A. IMPLEMENTATION OF REGIONAL PLAN-2021 FOR NCR

NCRPB as a coordination body has taken up various initiatives/actions for the effective implementation of policies of the RP-2021 through respective State Governments. Under the provisions of NCR Planning Board Act, 1985, the policies and proposals of the Regional Plan-2021 for NCR are to be implemented by the NCR participating State Governments/Agencies.

i. Review of Regional Plan-2021 for NCR

Board had initiated a review exercise for the Regional Plan-2021 (RP-2021) as per provisions of the NCR Planning Board Act, 1985. Extensive consultations were held with the NCR participating State Governments, Central Govt. Ministries/Departments and the final draft revised RP-2021 was presented to all Stakeholders in the Workshop on "Review and Revision of the Regional Plan-2021" to obtain their recommendations and suggestions. The draft revised RP- 2021 was also discussed and recommended by the Planning Committee in its 61st meeting held on 04.06.2013 and was subsequently approved by the Board in its 33rd Board meeting held on 01.07.2013 for inviting objections and suggestions from public under Section 12 of NCR Planning Board Act, 1985.

Consequently, the draft revised RP-2021 was published on 29.07.2013 for inviting objections/suggestions from the public, Central and State Governments and the local bodies under Section 12 (1) of the NCRPB Act, 1985 and Rule 23 of the NCRPB Rules,





1985. After thorough scrutiny and consideration of all the objections & suggestions, the Planning Committee in its 62nd meeting held on 03.10.2013, 15.10.2013 and 20.12.2013, sent its recommendations to the Board.

The Board in its 34th meeting held on 20.01.2014, discussed the recommendations of the Planning Committee and approved their incorporation in the plan. The Board also approved the revised RP-2021 of NCR for its publication and notification under Section 13 of the NCRPB Act, 1985 and Rule 27 of the NCRPB Rules, 1985.

Subsequently, the Board in its Special Meeting held on 25.04.2014 again discussed the revised RP-2021 and approved the same with some modifications. A direction was received from the PMO through the Ministry of Urban Development that since a number of issues were raised by the then Ministry of Environment and Forests (MoEF) on revised RP-2021, no final decision on the proposed revised Regional Plan-2021 should be taken until the issue raised by MoEF are resolved and a compliance report is sent to PMO. After incorporating/addressing all decisions of the Board and MoUD and modifications suggested by Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change (MoEF&CC), the draft revised RP-2021 was sent to MoUD vide U.O. Note dated 23.12.2014, seeking approval for publication under Section 13 of the NCRPB Act, 1985.

In response, MoUD vide their letter dated 31.3.2015 requested the NCR Planning Board to review the draft revised Regional Plan-2021 and incorporate the latest policies of the new Government such as Smart Cities, Digital India, Swachch Bharat Mission, etc. in the revised Regional Plan-2021 and send the revised draft alongwith compliance report to the Ministry.

Subsequently, the draft revised RP-2021 after incorporating the decisions/directions of the Board alongwith para-wise reply of NCRPB Secretariat on the views/comments/suggestions of MoEF&CC was sent to MoUD vide Board's letter dated 03.06.2015 and dated 10.7.2015 with the request to forward the same to MoEF&CC for their consent. MoUD, vide O.M. dated 27.07.2015, forwarded the same to MoEF&CC with a request to send comments/views at the earliest so that the draft revised RP-2021 may be modified after seeking the clearance from PMO.

In response, MoEF&CC, vide letter dated 30.09.2015, received through MoUD's letter dated 05.10.2015, provided its observations regarding the status of incorporation of its earlier views/comments/suggestions and conveyed the three suggestions which have not yet been addressed/incorporated in the draft revised RP-2021.

Detailed para-wise reply of NCRPB's Secretariat on the observations of MoEF&CC were sent to MoUD vide letter dated 23.10.2015 with a request that the draft revised RP-2021 alongwith compliance of comments/observations of MoEF&CC may be forwarded to the PMO for clearance. It was also conveyed that once the clearance is received from PMO, the draft revised RP-2021 will be placed before the Board for the approval for Notification of the Plan. The draft revised RP-2021 is under examination in consultation with MoEF&CC and NCRPB.

ii. Planning for newly added districts of NCR participating States in NCR

Government of India, vide Gazette Notification dated 01.10.2013, included Bhiwani and Mahendragarh districts of the State of Haryana and Bharatpur district of the State of Rajasthan in NCR. NCRPB requested the concerned State Governments for the preparation of the Plan for these new areas and incorporate the same in their respective Sub-Regional Plans. It was also requested that the planning for these districts be





undertaken by means of analysing the existing situation, identifying the issues & challenges at the ground /district level and then integrate the same with their respective Sub-Regional Plans.

NCRPB also signed a MOU with National Remote Sensing Centre (NRSC), Department of Space, Govt. of India, Hyderabad on 11.09.2015 for carrying out the Study on "Creation of Regional Land use for the three additional districts on NCR". Subsequently, Ministry notified addition of two more districts of State of Haryana (Jind and Karnal) and one district of State of UP (Muzaffarnagar) in NCR on 24.11.2015 which was published in Extraordinary Gazette of India No. 2508, Part II Section 3 Sub-section (ii), dated 26.11.2015. NRSC has been requested to include these areas also as a part of the study after obtaining the approval of PSMG-I.

iii. Studies undertaken

NCR Planning Board has completed three Studies i.e. on Economic Profile of NCR, Micro & Household Enterprise in NCR and Health Infrastructure in NCR, in this financial year. The basic purpose of the Studies was collection of data, analysis of data and identification of gaps, identification of Projects with costs and formulation of recommendations. Data and its analysis of all the Studies were used while reviewing the Regional Plan-2021. Also, all three Study Reports have been circulated to all concerned stakeholders, including NCR participating State Govts., their Agencies/Departments, concerned Ministries/Departments of the Central Government, etc. with a request that the findings of the Study be utilized and the proposals/recommendations of the Study be implemented in the respective sub-regions in order to ensure balanced and harmonious development in NCR.

iv. Functional Plan

Section 16 of the NCRPB Act, 1985 provides for that after the Regional Plan has come into operation, the Board may prepare, with the assistance of the Committee, as many Functional Plans as may be necessary for the proper guidance of the participating States and of the Union territory.

In pursuance of the above, NCRPB has prepared two draft functional Plans, namely the 'Functional Plan for Economic Development of NCR' and the 'Functional Plan on Drainage for NCR'. These two Functional Plans have been prepared to guide the NCR participating States to facilitate economic development and drainage in a sustainable, inclusive and optimum manner, which is essential in order to ensure growth and balanced development of NCR. The draft Functional Plan's will be placed before the Planning Committee of the Board for consideration and approval.

v. Preparation of Sub-Regional Plans under Regional Plan-2021 for NCR

Under Section 17(1) of the NCRPB Act, 1985 "Each participating State shall prepare a Sub-Regional Plan for the sub-region within that State and the Union Territory shall prepare a Sub-Regional Plan for the sub-region within the Union Territory".

The Sub-Regional Plans for sub-region are being prepared by the respective State Governments. Status of Preparation of Sub-Regional Plans is as under:

vi. Monitoring of Implementation of the Regional Plan-2021 for NCR

NCRPB as a coordination body has also taken up initiatives/actions for the effective implementation of policies through respective State Governments. Under the provisions of NCR Planning Board Act, 1985, the policies and proposals of the Regional Plan-2021 for NCR are to be implemented by the participating State Governments/Agencies both urban as well as rural and the Central Ministries/Departments/Agencies concerned.

Monitoring of implementation of the Regional Plan is done at various levels. In the NCR participating States, it is carried out by the Steering Committee under the Chairmanship of Chief Secretary of the NCR participating States with concerned Principal Secretaries as Members. In the NCR Planning Board, monitoring is done by the Board, Planning Committee and Project Sanctioning & Monitoring Group (PSMG) in its various meetings. In this financial year, One each meeting of the Board, Planning Committee, PSMG at NCRPB level and Steering Committee of Haryana and Rajasthan at State level were held for monitoring of implementation of the Regional Plan.

Further review meetings were held under the chairmanship of Member Secretary, NCRPB with NCR participating State Governments/NCR Planning and Monitoring Cells in this regard.

vii. Connectivity in NCR

a) Extension of Metro Rail to CNCR

Extension of Metro Rail to CNCR Towns, as proposed in the Regional Plan-2021, is being implemented by the Delhi Metro Rail Corporation (DMRC). Delhi Metro has been extended to Noida, Gurgaon and Ghaziabad (Vaishali). During the current Financial Year it has also been extended to Faridabad (Escorts Mujesar). The work on Faridabad (Escorts Mujesar) to Ballabhgarh and Mundka-Bahadrugarh Metro lines are in progress. In addition, Rapid Metro has been commissioned in Gurgaon.





b) Regional Rapid Transit System for NCR

The Functional Plan on Transport for NCR-2032 has recommended for fast and efficient mass transport for the commuters of NCR. In line with this, the Functional Plan on Transport-2032 has proposed Regional Rapid Transit System (RRTS) which is a fast and efficient rail based commuter transit system. The Task Force on RRTS has prioritized the following eight corridors:

Draft Detailed Project Report (DPR) of Delhi-Panipat RRTS Corridor has been prepared. Draft DPR of Delhi-Alwar and Delhi-2Meerut are at an advance stage of preparation/finalization.

The Cabinet on 11.07.2013 accorded the approval for the constitution of National Capital Region Transport Corporation (NCRTC) with an initial seed capital of Rs.100 crore for designing, developing, implementing, financing, operating and maintaining RRTS in NCR. The NCRTC has been incorporated on 21.08.2013. Further work related to implementation of RRTS, including preparation and finalization of DPR, costing and financing plan [including financing & Development through Transit Oriented Development (TOD)] is to be carried out by NCRTC.

c) Road Network

(i). Peripheral Expressway around Delhi

Five National Highways, namely, NH-1, NH-2, NH-8, NH-10 & NH-24 converge onto the Ring Road in NCT Delhi resulting in heavy congestion not only on the ring roads but also on major roads in Delhi. The National Highways change to urban arterial roads as part of Delhi road network. Also a large part of the congestion is caused by the vehicles not destined for Delhi but transiting through Delhi in the absence of any alternate routes.

In order to provide by-passes, Peripheral Expressway around Delhi was proposed in the Regional Plan for NCR. The western half of this bypass road linking NH-1 at Kundli in the North to NH-2 at Palwal in the South via NH-10 & NH-8 at western periphery of Delhi





has been designated as the Western Peripheral (Kundli-Manesar-Palwal) Expressway (WPE). The eastern half of this bypass road linking NH-1 at Kundli in the North to NH-2 at Palwal in the South via NH-24 on the Eastern side of Delhi has been designated as the Eastern Peripheral (Kundli-Ghaziabad-Palwal) Expressway (EPE). The implementation of WPE is being carried out by HSIIDC, Govt. of Haryana, which has intimated that the section of WPE from Palwal to Manesar has been commissioned and opened to public and work on section from Manesar to Kundli has been awarded and target date of completion is August, 2018.

The implementation of Eastern Peripheral Expressways is being done by National Highways Authority of India (NHAI), Ministry of Road Transport and Highways. The project has been approved by the Public Investment Board (PIB) on 05.03.2015 and by the Cabinet Committee on Economic Affairs (CCEA) on 16.07.2015. NHAI and MoRT&H are taking further action in this matter. The work has been awarded by NHAI on 14.09.2015 in six packages as informed in the 25th meeting of the Monitoring Committee held on 14.06.2016 in Ministry of Road Transport and Highways (MoRT&H).

A High Powered Committee was constituted under the chairmanship of Secretary, Ministry of Road Transport and Highways as a mechanism for finalizing the design details and monitoring in respect of Hon'ble Supreme Court's order dated 17.12.2004 in Writ Petition (Civil) No. 13029 of 1985 for construction of Bypasses and Expressway around Delhi. This Committee monitors the implementation of both the Expressways.

(ii) Delhi Meerut Expressway

The proposal for the construction of Delhi-Meerut Expressway, as proposed in the Regional Plan-2021, has been included by MoRT&H in NHDP-VI for implementation. NHAI and MoRT&H are taking action in this matter.

(iii) National Highways

In the National Capital Region, part of National Highway-1, 2, 8, 10, 11A, 24, 58, 71, 71-A, 71-B, 91, 93, 119, 235 and 236 form the road network in addition to State Highways and other roads. Regional Plan-2021 has proposed up-gradation of these National Highways. With the persuasion of the Board, action has been initiated by the Ministry of Road Transport & Highways to further up-grade these highways to 6- lanes or more as per the Regional Plan-2021 for NCR.

B. PROJECTS FINANCED BY THE BOARD:

Under section 8 (e) of the NCRPB Act, the Board can select and approve comprehensive schemes and provide assistance for the implementation of such schemes. The Board under the provisions of the above section has been financing various projects for implementation by the agencies within the National Capital Region with the over-arching goal of achieving the balanced development of the Region. NCR Planning Board provides financial assistance to the constituent States / NCT of Delhi and their implementing agencies in the form of loans up to a maximum of 75% of the estimated cost of Projects. The constituent States of NCR/NCT of Delhi or its implementing agency contribute 25% of the project cost as their share.





As on 31st March, 2016, the Board has provided financial assistance to 295 infrastructure development projects with an estimated cost of Rs. 27309 crore, out of which an amount of Rs. 12157 crore has been sanctioned as loan. The Board has released a loan amount of Rs. 7222 crore till March, 2016.

The 53rd PSMG-I meeting held in January 2016, approved financial assistance worth about **Rs. 3113 Cr.** for 9 infrastructure development projects having an estimated cost of around **Rs. 7838 Cr.** which is highest in a single meeting since the inception of the Board. The projects include 4 ROBs and 3 Road development projects from Haryana and one elevated road and the Metro Link from Noida to Greater Noida pertaining to Uttar Pradesh Subregion

The sub-region wise break up including completed and ongoing projects is as below in Table 1.



- Non-Plan Grant received from the Ministry of Urban Development for meeting expenditure towards salaries and allowance & other office expenses of the Board - Rs.4.00 crore.

Internal and Extra Budgetary Resources

- Internal Accruals i.e. interest earned from loans to State Governments & their parastatals and banks deposits etc. - Rs.426.09 crores.
- Repayments of loans (principal) by the borrowers viz. State Governments and their parastatals- Rs.590.29 crore. There has been no default in repayment of loan by State Governments and their implementing agencies. The recovery is 100%.

(ii) Resource Mobilization

Domestic Capital Markets

- Board has not raised any amount from the domestic capital market during F.Y.2015-16. The Board has redeemed an Unsecured Taxable Bonds (2019) Series-I, amounting Rs.265.10 Crore in Feb. 2016 by exercising Call Option. This expenditure has been met from Bond Redemption Reserve.
- As on 31st March, 2016, total outstanding borrowing of the NCRPB through Bonds is Rs.634.90 crore. The tenure of the said bonds is 10 years with put/call option after 7 years. The bonds have also been listed at National Stock Exchange (NSE)-WDM segment and Corporation Bank has been appointed as Trustee to the bond issue.
- NCR Planning Board continued to enjoy a rating of 'AAA' (Stable Outlook) by CRISIL, ICRA. These are the highest investment grade ratings and will enable NCRPB to raise resources at economical rates from the capital market as well as to help access of funds from multi-lateral and bi-lateral sources.
- All payments due on account of interest have been paid to the investors on time. There was no default on part of the Board.

Multi-lateral/Bilateral Funding

Loan from ADB

 The Asian Development Bank (ADB) has approved loan of US\$ 150 million to NCRPB for financing infrastructure in NCR & CMAs. The loan has been guaranteed by GOI. The first tranche of US\$ 78 million was





signed on 17-3-2011. Out of tranche-1 loan amount of USD 78 million, USD 18 million has been cancelled. Board has already utilized the entire loan amount of USD 60 million by the loan closing date of 31.12.2014 for tranche-1.

Board has been making regular payments of its dues to ADB.

Loan from KfW-German bi-lateral agency

- Loan agreements of Euro 100 million + Euro 1 million Grant for environment friendly schemes in the water supply, sewerage, drainage, solid waste management and urban transport Sectors to National Capital Region Planning Board was were signed on dated 9.2.2012 & 30.3.2012 respectively. The repayment period will be 15 years with a 5 years moratorium for repayment of the principal amount. The loan is at fixed rate of Interest @1.83% p.a. The Board has claimed and received reimbursement of EURO 19.31 million from KfW upto the financial year 2015-16.
- Board has been making regular payments of its dues to KfW.

(iii) Audit of Accounts

 The Annual Report and audited Annual Accounts of the Board for 2014-15, together with Audit Certificate from C&AG, have been laid on the table of the both the Houses of Parliament by the MoUD.

(iv) Capacity Development Initiatives

- Manuals and Toolkits for enhancing capacity of NCRPB and various implementing agencies in the area of project planning, DPR preparation, project appraisal, risk management, PPP, financial and treasury management have been prepared under ADB Technical Assistance through Consultants appointed by ADB and made available through NCRPB website for wider usage. These toolkits and manuals will greatly enhance the capabilities of NCRPB officials, State government/ULB officials in the area of planning, good quality DPR preparation, appraisal and implementation and will enable NCRPB to play an effective financial intermediary's role.
- The KfW has approved and appointed Consultancy firm M/s. GKW Consult GmbH (formerly M/s. Lahmeyer GKW Consult, Germany) towards Technical Assistance (TA) for appraisal of Detailed Project Reports (DPRs), capacity development of NCRPB and its stakeholders.





E. NEW INITIATIVE

• The Board has increased the tenure of loan for priority infrastructure projects viz. Water Supply, Sewerage, Sanitation, Drainage and Solid Waste Management from 10 years to 15 years including 3 years moratorium for re-payment of principal amount. In order to further encourage and incentivize States/ULBs to provide water, sewerage and drainage services in the NCR in a time-bound manner, NCRPB approved 15% of the project cost as Grants. To encourage Transport, Water and Sanitation sector projects which have long gestation period and low returns, the Board continued to charge low interest rate of 7.50% p.a. Further, to promote power sector projects, it had been placed under priority sector and the rate of interest charged is 7.50% p.a.

F. ADMINISTRATION & VIGILANCE

i) ADMINISTRATION

The Secretariat of NCRPB comprises of planning, Administration & Establishment, Finance and project wings. The total sanctioned and actual strength of the Board as on 31.3.2016 is as follows:

The Board is also implementing the reservation policy as per the guidelines of Government of India from time to time. One officer of the Board has been nominated as Liaison Officer for SC/ST/OBC, PH (Person with Disabilities) and minorities in the NCR Planning Board.

ii) VIGILANCE

The Joint Director (Tech.) has been appointed as a Part time Chief Vigilance Officer for the organization. All vigilance related matters and issues are handled by Part Time CVO.

In order to improve vigilance administration by promoting e-governance, as mandated by Central Vigilance Commission, the NCR Planning Board has put up a web-site (http://ncrpb.nic.in) to disseminate information about mandate and functions of the Board, systems and procedure followed in decision making including guidelines to the borrowers seeking loan assistance. The web-site also provides complete information on Acts, Rules & Regulations, Regional Plans Brochure with major features, status of various plans, comprehensive guidelines to the borrowers





seeking loan assistance, terms & conditions of loan, interest rates charged and rebates available, status of Projects, Annual Report, Annual Accounts. It also provides information on complete loan documentation including forms to be used by the borrowers, in a downloadable format, with an area earmarked for tenders/RFP etc. The web-site also indicates information regarding advertising of vacant posts, eligibility criteria for recruitment, in addition to other essential information required by the potential candidates.

iii) RIGHT TO INFORMATION (RTI):

Six Public Information Officers (PIOs) and three Appellate Authorities have been designated as per Section 5(1) of RTI Act, 2005. The details of PIOs and Appellate Authorities have also been uploaded on the website of the Board. The officers have been sensitized, and internal procedure streamlined, right from the receipt of applications to providing of information to the applicant within the prescribed time frame. The prescribed procedure is being followed by all the staff/officers for disseminating information to the applicants. Besides, periodical monitoring is also done at appropriate level, so as to ensure timely supply of information, 82 RTI applications were received and disposed of during the period April 2015 - March 2016. This office has been regularly uploading Quarterly and Annual returns on Central Information Commission (CIC) website and intimating the same to Ministry of Urban Development.


iv) E-PROCUREMENT:
